### From the Assistant Principal

**Whole School Assembly:** KD will present their work at the next Whole School Assembly this Friday 28<sup>th</sup> July commencing at 12:15pm in Kenna Hall. All welcome.

**Pupil Free Day:** A big thank you to Mrs Aumuller for organising and leading the Pupil Free day on Project Based Learning last Monday. It was a great day which the children will benefit from. Following input about Project Based Learning the teachers worked collaboratively to plan a Project Based Learning experience into one of their units of work.

**Protected Learning Time:** It is wonderful to walk around our school during Protected Learning Time (9:00am-11:00am Monday to Thursday) and see the uninterrupted focus on learning. The high expectations on students who are working at their individual level is obvious as is the variety of activities, engagement of students, teachers and student assistants.

***This week I had the opportunity to be involved in lessons with the Year 5 children. I helped out with timed reading to develop reading fluency and multiplication of double digit numbers. The children are engaged and producing excellent work.***

***A big "SHOUT OUT" TO THE YEAR 5 TEACHERS AND CHILDREN FOR THE WONDERFUL WORK THEY ARE DOING IN MULTIPLICATION AND READING.***

**Behaviour Management Policy:** We have begun our journey to implement the School Positive Behaviour for Learning program at McAuley (SPB4L). We have formed a school committee that will work with Bathurst Catholic Education Office Staff to implement the program in our

school. At this week's meeting the committee discussed "hot spots" on our playground and an improved way of dealing with major incidents on the playground. This will be explained to the children and parents once it has been refined. Minor incidents will still be dealt with by the teacher issuing an on the spot consequence.

**ICAS Tests:** Nominations for ICAS Maths & English Tests have closed. The children from Year 3 to Year 6 who nominated for these will sit them on the following dates:

- English-Tuesday 1<sup>st</sup> August
- Mathematics -Tuesday 15<sup>th</sup> August.

These tests are not compulsory or set on the Australian Curriculum that we implement. They are one way of acknowledging the achievement of students that are working above grade level.

**Out of Bounds:** Occasionally balls will be kicked or thrown over the fences surrounding the playground. Children are not permitted to leave the school grounds to get a ball. If a teacher has time they may be able to retrieve it otherwise parents can go and ask the neighbours if they can retrieve it after school. Often the neighbours will throw balls back over the fence or return them.

**Technology at School:** A reminder that students are not to have mobile phones, ipods and other technology at school. If it is necessary that they bring such a device then it is to be given to the class teacher at the beginning of the day and collected at the conclusion of school. Important messages can be delivered via the school office.

### FOCUS FOR THE FORTNIGHT:

**Focus of the Fortnight: Always play appropriately on the playground:**

The focus this fortnight is on how children behave on the playground. With approximately 530 children on our playground during breaks we have a relatively small amount of incidents, accidents and arguments! However, from time to time we do have issues on the playground. The children will be reminded to:

- keep your hands and feet to yourself
- play appropriately
- treat others how you want to be treated
- inform a teacher if someone is being hurt physically or emotionally.

**Year 3 – Year 6 Winter Sport:** Our highly anticipated Winter Sport Program for Year 3 – Year 6 students began last week. Year 3 & Year 4 participate on Thursdays and Year 5 & Year 6 participate on Friday. The children take part in a variety of sports. All activities take place indoors to ensure our children are active despite the often wet and cold weather during winter in Orange. A huge thank you to Mrs Bettizoli for organising this for the children. It is a massive job.

**Reading / Literacy Work with Sarah McDonagh:** This week Sarah McDonagh worked with Mrs Sands and Mrs Kelly on developing the school based Scope & Sequence for phonics. Sarah attended our staff meeting where she explained to the staff how the Phonics Scope and sequence works. Sarah also went through our latest DIBELS results which are showing a remarkable improvement following changes to how we teach reading at McAuley. ***A big shout out to the teachers and children for the amazing improvement in DIBELS results. Keep up the great work in reading.***

We also have three important feasts this term, starting with our very own Australian Saint, Mary MacKillop on 8<sup>th</sup> August. The week after we celebrate the Assumption of Mary our Mother on 15<sup>th</sup> August. During our last week of term we honour our School Patron, Catherine McAuley as we celebrate our School Celebration Day. At the beginning of September, we celebrate Fathers' day. We look forward to another term of many celebrations!

**Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time:** In Matthew's Gospel this weekend, Jesus is trying to relate what the Kingdom of Heaven is really like. As He is the only one with true personal knowledge of this place, and He is trying to find words that help us to understand the magnitude of just how wonderful it really is. Sometimes we have experienced something that is truly awesome and find it very difficult to try and capture it's wonder when describing it to others. Jesus is finding the same situation here. He compares it to treasure found in a field, where the finder will sell everything he owns in order to have enough money to buy this one field. In other words, the Kingdom of God is so wonderful, it is worth everything we have. But we can't buy this treasure with money. For us to possess this treasure, we need to earn it. **Confirmation:** Our Year 6 experienced an amazing day yesterday with a Confirmation Retreat conducted by the Year 10 students of James Sheahan. This day was a wonderful way for our students to explore the role of the Holy Spirit in their lives as they prepare for their Confirmation. A very big thank you to Mrs Amber Calleja and Mitch, along with their team of 18 students who ran the day. A reminder that there will be a practice in St Mary's Church next Wednesday evening (2<sup>nd</sup> August) at 7pm for all Confirmation Candidates, and if possible, their Sponsors. As the Confirmation Ceremony has several extra parts to that of the normal Mass, it is important that the candidates are familiar with this, therefore the practice is very important. Bishop Michael McKenna will administer the Sacrament in our Parish on the weekend of 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> August 2017. Please now keep the Year 6 Confirmation candidates and their teachers in your prayers.

**Jeans for Genes Day:** On Friday, 4<sup>th</sup> August, (Friday next week) we will be fund-raising for Jeans for Genes Day. Children are invited to wear their denim jeans to school and contribute a gold coin, which will be sent to the Children's Medical Research Institute. This money will assist with the funding of research into cures for childhood diseases. Students are not expected to wear any part of their uniform, as this is a casual clothes day. ### Prioritised Essential Learning Targets for Mathematics Term 3

In grade collaborative teams (Professional Learning Teams) our school has prioritised the content from our Mathematics syllabus. In doing this we will ensure that all students in the grade are given the best possible opportunity to achieve the identified essential knowledge and skills required for them to advance to the next grade.

Through common formative assessments across the grade our teachers are able to identify the students who have reached proficiency in the target areas and who are ready to conquer the Mathematics syllabus in its entirety. Teachers are also able to identify those students who require more explicit instruction (in some cases a program of intervention) and those requiring extension and enrichment tasks.

Below are the identified prioritised essential learning targets for each grade for Term 3 in Mathematics. The prioritised essential learning targets will be the focus for PLTs to ensure that at the very least these fundamental skills and knowledge are learnt.

Please use this as a guide to reinforce the learning that is taking place in our classrooms.

This is a process which we are now developing in our English programming also. Our teacher teams are collaborating to develop essential learning targets in Writing and are applying the process to the teaching of Reading. We hope to share these targets via our newsletter once they have been developed.

Term 3 Mathematics Targets	
Kindergarten	Model subtraction by separating & taking away part of a group of objects.
Year 1	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Use o'clock to read the time using digital and analogue clocks.</li><li>2. Name the months and seasons of the year and place in correct order.</li></ol>
Year 2	Use an analogue and digital clock to read and show time to the quarter hour using the term past and to.
Year 3	Read analogue & digital clocks to the minute.
Year 4	Convert fractions to decimal notation.
Year 5	State the place value of digits in decimal numbers of up to 3 decimal places.
Year 6	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Solve problems involving addition and subtraction of fractions with the same or related denominators.</li><li>2. Convert between common units of length.</li></ol>

### Arrival At School

There are some children arriving at school well before 8.35am. Please note that playground supervision does not begin until **8:35am**. Whilst we do understand that there may be occasional instances when arrival before this time is unavoidable, we cannot guarantee that the gates will be opened.

The first gate that will be opened is the gate between Kenna Hall and the school office in Hill St. Children who arrive prior to 8:35am are asked to move through this gate and directly to the undercover seats in Area A where they are to remain SEATED to wait for the teachers to arrive on duty. The remaining gates will be opened by the supervising teachers when duty commences at 8:35am.

Once again, students should not be arriving at school before 8:35am and if arrival before this time is unavoidable (**this should not be the normal routine**) then children must follow the above procedure.

### Afternoon Pick-Up Procedures

On advice from the RMS we remind parents to collect children from the school grounds in the afternoon. (Either Byng St or Hill St pick-up locations) **Students will not be allowed to walk to parents waiting in cars.** As cars reverse park it is very difficult to see young children who are not in the presence of an adult and this creates a very dangerous situation.

If your child walks/ride home, a note must be sent in to provide permission for children to walk/ride home without an adult. Only these children are permitted to leave the school grounds without the supervision of an adult. In these instances please ensure that you have mapped the safest route for your child and that they are aware of safety protocols should they encounter any difficult situations on their way home.

Please note that no children are permitted to use the play equipment or to use sporting equipment (soccer balls etc) after the school day has ended even if they are in the presence of their parent or guardian. **We ask that you be diligent in reminding your children of this school rule.**

We thank you for your support in ensuring that our students are safe when arriving and leaving the school grounds.

## STEM in Year 6

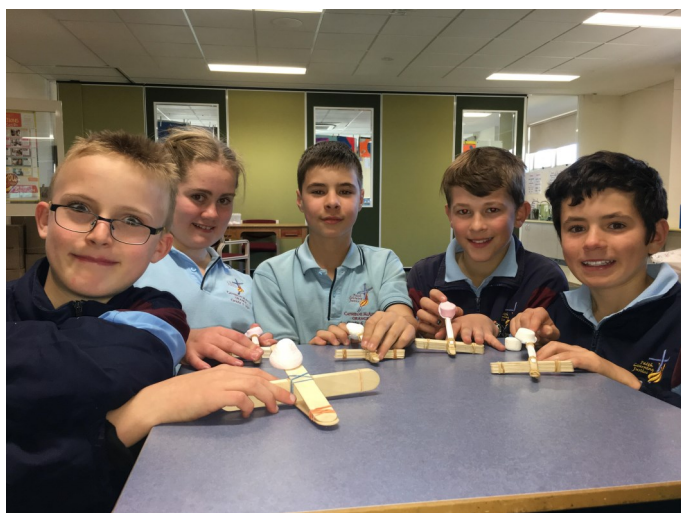
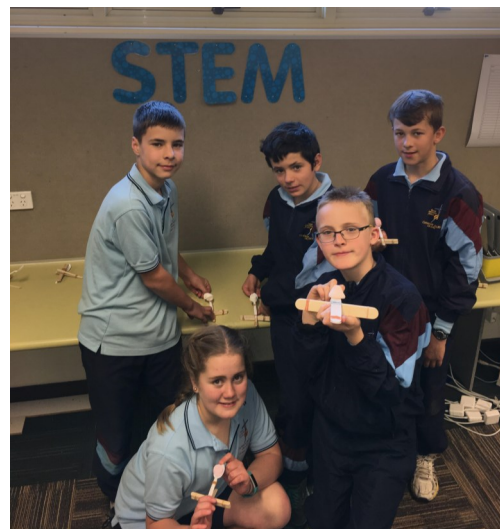
### What is STEM?

STEM education is the learning of science, technology, engineering and mathematics in an integrated approach. Students gain and apply knowledge, deepen their understanding and develop creative and critical thinking skills within an authentic context. It may include inquiry and project-based learning.

During Term Three Tuesday afternoons will be dedicated to STEM for Year 6. In weeks 1,3,4,5,6,7,8 and 9 students will be given a number of science, technology and engineering challenges. Each session will run for a two week period where they will compete against each other to see who will be the STEM champions for 2017.

The first challenge (Weeks 1 and 3) will involve students creating Marshmallow catapults. Seeing which goes the furthest, which is most accurate and which is more reliable.

**Parents** are more than welcome to not only come along at 2:15pm on a Tuesday afternoon but also **form your own team** to go against your children. If you would like to come and take the challenge then Week 3 would be your starting point. Come and enjoy the fun with Year 6.

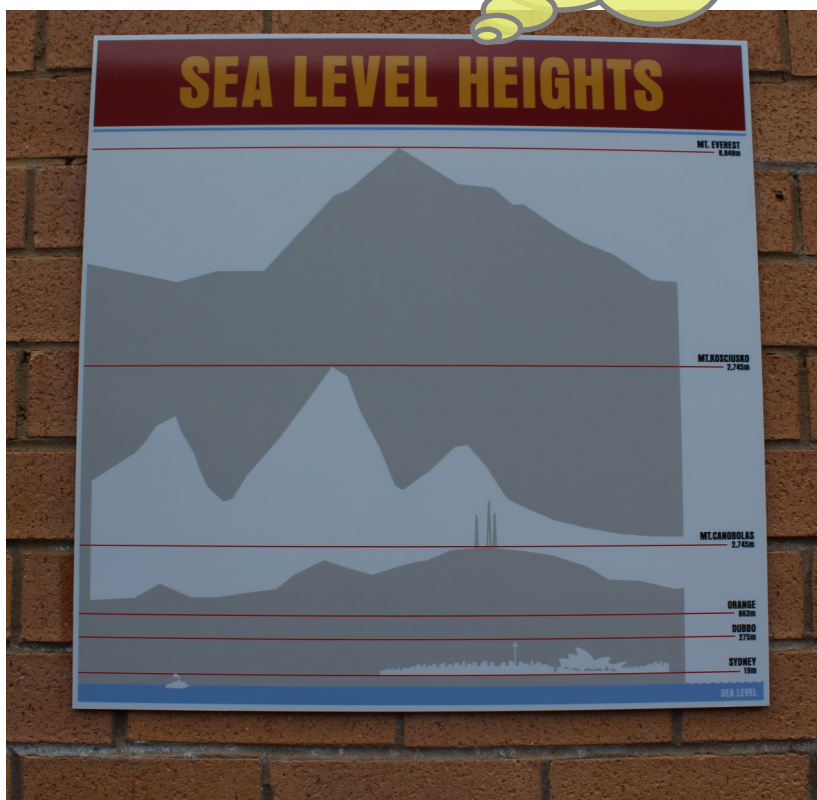
